Adjunct Professor, Sociology, Bunker Hill Community College



Anita Jain is an Adjunct Professor of Sociology at Bunker Hill Community College. Taught courses include Introductory Sociology, Social Problems, Cultural Diversity, and Social Theory, built around discussion-based learning, applied projects, and digital platforms. With more than a decade of experience spanning higher education, special education, and ESOL settings, she designs inclusive curricula and supports academic success through literacy, numeracy, and digital learning strategies. She has delivered ESOL instruction for Boston Public Schools, developing lessons focused on college readiness and career language development for high school and adult learners, and works as a special education teacher in Chelsea, Massachusetts. Jain holds a master's degree in sociology from Punjab University and is certified in sheltered English instruction.

James S. May

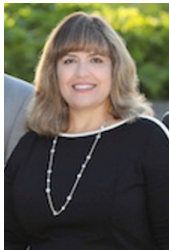
Professor, English for Academic Purposes, Valencia College

In addition to teaching, she has led and contributed to numerous campus initiatives, including the WAVES Program for new faculty, TARA the AI Teaching Assistant, the Social Sciences AI Task Force, psychology textbook selection, the Annual Week of the Child Program, and a STEM minority representation pilot program. She also volunteers as a judge for engineering and robotics competitions and has supported professional development, cultural programming, scholarship, and review committees. Insua-Auais recently completed the League AI Fellows Program, has received two Endowed Teaching Chairs, and holds degrees in clinical psychology, mental health counseling, and criminal justice. Outside of her professional work, she lives in Broward County with her husband and children, and enjoys crafting, digital scrapbooking, baking, and traveling.
