The Toolkit identifies various solutions that have been successfully implemented and highlights real-world examples that can be replicated. In 2013, one year after its launch, ACE ran a survey of Toolkit users to determine how institutions were using the Toolkit and its impact on student veteran programs. Additionally, ACE recently launched a new and improved site. This presentation will report on the results from the survey showing where most institutions are focusing the majority of their efforts and the impact the Toolkit is having on institutions across the country. It will also discuss innovative ways of serving student veterans and demonstrate new features of the Toolkit, including the discussion forum and guest bloggers.

HOTEL MAP



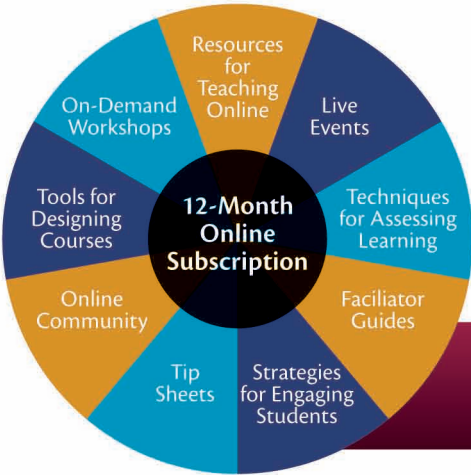
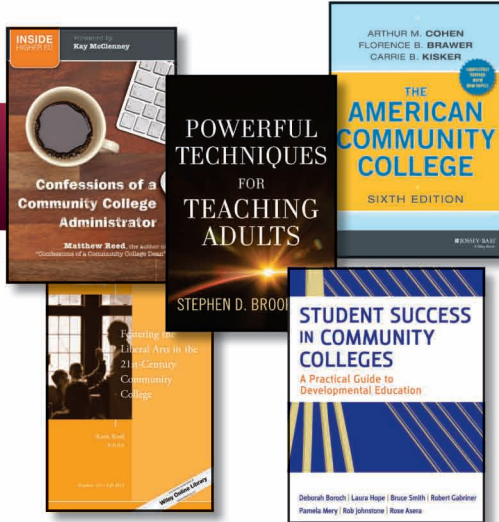
