Results of Survey Eight: Key Trends in the Community College

Enclosed you will find the results of our eighth survey in the "What do Presidents Want to Know About" series. I think you will find the results interesting, particularly the strong agreement around the impact of technology and impending accountability measures. The most striking result, however, is the overwhelming agreement that "over the next ten years more faculty will retire than have in the last twenty years." The most encouraging finding to the League and our new Learning Initiative is the strong positive responses to the trend of community colleges becoming more learning-centered.

For your information, these data have also been integrated into a comprehensive white paper on key trends in the community college recently commissioned by two key League partners. The paper is entitled, Community Colleges Winning through Innovation: Taking on the Changes and Choices of Leadership in the Twenty-First Century, and will be distributed by IBM and PeopleSoft. ## A survey of and for Alliance for Community College Innovation institutions

This survey was composed of questions exploring key trends in the community college as identified in the current national literature and conference programs.

The following survey results are drawn from the 523 presidents surveyed. The survey had a response rate of 62 percent.
